Q: How did you end up living in Durango? Was there a choral society then?

JD: I was born and raised in Atlanta, Georgia, and never lived anywhere else till we moved here. My husband and I had always dreamed of living the in the Colorado mountains. It was literally a dart board decision to pick Durango, and after we visited, we knew this was the place. We moved here and I never looked back. I believe the Choral Society was here then, in 1998, and Linda Mack may have just taken the helm but I didn't audition till a few years later. I had always sung in church choirs and done solo work, but never in a full chorus. I feel my real music education began when singing under Dr. Mack.

Q: Why did you join the Choral Society, as a singer and also as a Board Member?

JD: It had been a few years since I used my voice, and I wanted to sing again so I called Linda. The audition did not go well... she said I had a pretty voice under all the rust, and would invite me in if I agreed to take voice lessons, which I did. After about a year I learned the Choral Society was hiring! Apparently, nobody on the Board wanted to take minutes, so they advertised for a paid administrator. I got the job and faithfully attended and recorded all the board meetings for the next three years. I decided I would like a vote, so invited myself to join the board. Turns out I did the exact same job, just wasn't getting paid for it. I served two terms, mostly as secretary, and my last year as president.

Q: What's one of your favorite pieces of music that you have sung? And where did you sing it?

JD: I love all the masses and requiems we have sung. My favorites have been the Mozart Requiem which we performed at Carnegie Hall in 2009 under the baton of John Rutter, a famous composer of sacred music. We have sung this piece many times since. My other favorite was the Poulenc Gloria, which we sang in Durango and Farmington with the San Juan Symphony Orchestra. This was the first major work I had ever sung.

Q: Have you gone on any of the DCS overseas trips?

JD: I have gone on all but one of the DCS overseas trips. The one I missed was Greece because I already had two transatlantic trips planned that year within six months and just couldn't squeeze in a third.

Q: Who is your favorite recording artist? Band?

JD: I have always been a classical music nerd. But modern music—e.g., 70s, 80s—I love Queen, The Eagles, ABBA. Oh, and the guy who wrote Classical Gas in about 1970, Mason Williams. Not to mention the folk singers of that era, Joan Baez, Judy Collins, and Joannie Mitchell.

Q: Do you play an instrument?

JD: I failed miserably at becoming accomplished at any instruments, even though I was playing piano by ear at age 4. I probably started too early with lessons, did not have a good teacher, and got sick and tired of practicing. I taught myself how to play guitar in college, picked up things from friends and jam sessions, and sang in bars and coffee shops. Then as an older adult I took up cello. Didn't much like practicing that either, so gave that up, especially when my favorite teacher moved away.

Q: Best concert you've ever been to? Last concert you went to?

JD: Two really memorable: Yanni in concert in Atlanta decades ago; and Yo-Yo Ma in concert with the Albuquerque Symphony Orchestra before they folded. But guess what! Their fabulous conductor (who never uses a score) was hired in Durango as Director for Music in the Mountains.

Q: What is one quality you like most about yourself? What is one thing you would change in yourself if you could?

JD: Most: loyalty. Least, and wish I could change: procrastination.

Q: Other interests and hobbies?

JD: I try to stay involved in the community. I love to travel any chance I get, even if it's just few days in Santa Fe or a shopping trip in ABQ. My last trip before the pandemic was to India and Dubai. Wow! Otherwise, I'm pretty much a homebody and try to stay in shape by biking, boxing, and walking.

Q: Why do you support the DCS so generously?

JD: DCS has meant the world to me. Not only the beautiful music and a broad music education, but also the family atmosphere. Linda emphasizes that we get to know our choral mates, and I have made some lifelong friends in DCS. With all this given to me, I feel the least I can do is to give back where I can.
