## Spotlight on DCS Board Member and Chorus Alto, Lynn Eustance



Born in upstate New York many years ago, I was raised in a family of six with two sisters and a brother, all younger than I. My father was a chemist for General Electric, my mother a stay-athome mom busy

with four kids, her music (piano, voice), house, and home. Dad played the trumpet, well but only occasionally. Mom taught us all the basics of piano, and then we (and she) were taught by others until sister Kerry went on with it and the rest of us went our own ways. I was singing and playing guitar in hootenannies on TV and on stage while in my teens, singing in high school chorus and glee clubs, playing Rosie in "Bye Bye Birdie," and auditioning and being selected for NY State School Music Association All-State Choir. I sang in choirs during the first 2 years of college, then transferred and, for some reason, did not continue singing. For 32 YEARS!!

I loved Durango the minute I saw it, on vacation with my roommate Mollie. We camped at Hermosa Meadows Camper Park, if any of you remember that—the Kielys live approximately there now. It was wonderful. I arrived permanently in the fall of 1976, found an apartment and settled in. A year and a half later, after a softball game, the team celebrated its victory at The Solid Muldoon. I looked up at the bar from a period couch/chair seating arrangement and saw a man, looked up at him again, went to sit next to him, and that was that. I married that man, Jim Adkins, four (4!) months later, in the fall of 1978.

Since then, Jim and I worked hard and scraped by. I worked in a construction company at the time, starting out as receptionist, and climbing up to estimator/drafter/purchaser/receiver and sometimes office manager. Jim worked for various excavation companies, as well as in the oil-field. He pursued his dream of having/raising mules, and we bought property that could hold a few. We took equine Al courses at CSU, and got into it (metaphorically and actually). Many a night we were outside urging and waiting for our jack to love a mare. But we

did have wonderful times riding, packing and driving our mules, and seeing lots of country we never would have on foot. We both tired of working "for the other guy," and each started her/his own business. I and a fellow female estimator started a business providing plans for contractors' bids, materials take-offs, payrolls and bookkeeping, all construction-related. Jim started a painting company, cleaning brushes at our outside spigot at night. His company, Mesa Color, started growing; I was doing his books and payroll in my off-hours. In the meantime, we built a house—he was hands-on; I was managing from the office. We decided that if we could build a house together, we could work together. I bowed out of my partnership and joined forces with Mesa Color.

In 2002 my dad died. I was needing an outlet. While attending a CPR class, I met a woman—and I can't remember her name!—who was wearing a red DCS sweatshirt. I kept thinking about it, and finally called Linda and auditioned. I started singing in January, 2003. I am SO happy I did. I had forgotten how much music fills my soul.

When I told my sister of the choir, she suggested I get on the Board. I thought about it, especially after Liza pleaded for donations that season, and I spoke with Bob Westerwick who invited me to a meeting at Linda's house. Of course, I spoke up when the financials were distributed. Whoops! I was in. 2004 or 2005, I think. And here I am still. And I could not be happier about it.

During all this, Jim and I shared many adventures—in Oregon, Death Valley, Costa Rica, Mayan ruins in Guatemala and Mexico, Australia, New Zealand, British Columbia, Grand Canyon, Alaska, Texas, Canyon de Chelly, Louisiana, Utah, New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Wyoming, Iceland, Minnesota, and this year we found our lovely little winter home in Baja, Mexico.

DCS is a huge and important part of my life. I am so grateful for both the social, emotional, artistic, and creative outlet of our choir/family, as well as the opportunity and honor to serve our Board/family all these years.
